Then the word of the Lord came to Isaiah, saying, go and say to Hezekiah, "Thus says the Lord, the God of your father David, 'I have heard your prayer, I have seen your tears; behold, I will add fifteen years to your life. Is. 38:4-5

But Hezekiah gave no return for the benefit he received, because his heart was proud; therefore wrath came on him and on Judah and Jerusalem.

God's Will

- ✓ When we listen to God.
 - He works his will according to his <u>Purpose</u>.
 - <u>Peace</u> reigns.
 - Lives are <u>redeemed</u> and <u>delivered</u> to God.
 - Evil is beaten before it starts.
 - <u>Defeat</u> and <u>captivity</u> are avoided.

✓ When God listens to us.

- We get our way, regardless of God's purpose.
- Confusion and chaos reign.
- Lives are put at risk.
- Evil finds a new doorway.
- <u>Captivity</u> comes before deliverance.

God's ultimate perfect plan shall come to pass. Within this divine purpose He has allowed us to see the less than perfect results of our attempts to advise Him. From the beginning mankind has sought to negotiate with God, to take authority from him, and tell him what to do. The result has always been confusion, chaos, suffering, and further loss. Yet when we submit to the will of God his perfect purpose is then made clear to us.
