## • The historical context.

- The last half of Isaiah (ch. 40-66) begins with its focus on Judah in exile, and its rescue by the Persian Empire under Cyrus and later Darius, who financed the reconstruction of Jerusalem and the temple.
- Dates
  - 605 BC-562 BC: reign of Nebuchadnezzar.
  - 587 BC: Jerusalem falls to Babylon.
  - 539 BC: Babylon falls to Cyrus the Persian.
  - C. 522 BC: Beginning of return and reconstruction of Jerusalem.
- The text: Chapter 41.
  - V. 1-4: God, the judge, begins his summation.
    - The call to judgment.
  - V. 5-7: The human response.
    - Relying on false beliefs. \_\_\_\_\_\_
  - V. 8-16: The promise to Israel.
    - I am your strength; I am your redeemer.

- V. 17-20: God's plan for the poor and needy.
  - They will not be forsaken. \_\_\_\_\_\_
  - So that **they** may see.
- V. 21-29: Taunt to the false prophets.
  - Show me how well you decipher history.
  - Show me how well you predict the future.
  - Because you are so useless I have had to go to an outside agency in order get help.
- A warning for those who attempt to speak for God without knowing what he has already declared.
