- 1. Vs. 1-4: Show your power, O Lord.
 - So that the earth would tremble at your sight.
 - That the whole world would know you are God.
 - As when you delivered us in our beginnings.
 - There has never been a God like you, who made nature bow at your presence.
- 2. Vs. 5-7: We have become weak and aimless in your absence.
 - You were (are) gracious to those who do "right."
 - But you were angry, <u>and</u> we sinned. (As a child revolting against discipline.)
 - And because you hid yourself we have become bitter and jaded.
 - No longer does anyone call on you, and we are left to deceit of our own divisive ways.
- 3. Vs. 8-12: Yet you are still our father.
 - We are but clay: the work of your hand.
 - Don't be angry forever, we are still your children.

- Our lives have become utterly desolate.
- Can you continue to be silent at the witness of our ruin in the sight of what was once your glory?
