The Transfiguration: broadening the vision, Matthew Ch.17:1-13.

Whatever the endeavor, whether personal ambition or philanthropic enterprise, humans need a vision of what can be in order to put forth their best effort. In other words, we need inspiration. We can be given a key to a doorway, but unless we have some idea of what is behind it, we are compelled by little more than curiosity. A vision, though, engages our senses; vision, taste, smell, feeling, and emotions. It will keep us awake at night trying to figure out how to get more.

The Disciples witness the transfiguration

- 6 days after Jesus warned his disciples regarding the high cost of discipleship (16:24-28), he withdrew to a high mountain with Peter, James, and John.
 - From their perspective, he was transfigured before them.
 - *Metamorphoo (gr.), to alter, change one's form.*
 - They also saw Moses and Elijah.
 - How did they recognize them?
- Peter's reaction.
 - It's cool that we're here; if you want we can build three huts for you. _____
- God's immediate response.
 - Out of a bright cloud, God spoke: this is my beloved son, with whom I am well-pleased: listen to him.
- The disciple's next reaction.
 - They fell on their faces in fear.
 - Oops did we say something wrong?
