## Renewing the Old Conflict, Matthew Ch.2

Though not much is made of Herod in the Biblical text, his impact on Judea and Judaism was pivotal in bringing about the corruption of the culture and faith. He was the first non-Jewish king, being of Idumean (Edomite) descent. He was appointed king by the Roman emperor Augustus, and one of his first acts was to replace the Jewish high priest with another of his choosing, whom he later had assassinated. He bought his way into favor with the Pharisees, and replaced the old second Temple with an elaborate new one, and then proceeded to further corrupt it by placing a golden eagle statue over the main gate. His plan was to outdo God, and when confronted by Messianic prophecy told him by the Magi, he then attempted to have him or his new king killed.
